
How do I help my child to learn their spellings?



Research shows that there are 3 types of "spellers":

- 1) Effortless spellers (a small group).
- 2) Those who require explicit practice and teaching to learn new spellings.
- 3) Those who find it extremely difficult and frustrating-this is not related to intelligence.

Why is it important to spell well?

- Good spelling skills build confidence in literacy in general.
- ▶ It improves communication.
- Learners who feel confident with letters and word patterns are able to read and comprehend more complex texts.
- Poor spelling distracts the reader.
- ► It affects how people view competence (e.g. future applications and CVs).




Children may get differentiated spellings dependent on their needs.

Look, Cover, Write

- ► This is a repetitive strategy
- Look at the word first, look at the shape, visualise it.
- ► Say the word.
- ▶ Next, cover the word.
- Finally, write it.
- ► Children must check and correct mistakes.






Words within Words

- **Example:**



Highlight Helper


Colour in tricky parts of the words.

Example: Wednesday, colour




Post-It Plenty

Write out any new vocabulary down on post-it notes and stick them on the furniture or word wall to see every day.




Spelling Games

| Look, Cover, Write This is a repetitive strategy of looking at the word first to really see the word, look at the shape, visualise it. To then say the word. | Sounding Out The Word Sound the word out little by little. If it sounds wrong, try changing the vowel sound from long to short or vice versa. Example: definite - long - de/fine/it (fine as in fine day) short - de/fin/it (fin as in shark's fin) | Mnemonics Make a phrase or sentence up about a word that you have difficulty spelling. Example: because = big elephants can always understand small elephants | |
| Picture Words Create pictures from the syllables. Example: underfoot | Highlight Helper Colour in tricky parts of the words. Example: Wednesday, colour | |
| Say It As You Spell It This technique supports picture words. Example: Wed/nes/day, fav/our, dis/tinc/tion | Chanting's The Charm Chant or sing the word. Your voice could become louder, higher pitched, deeper, sad, happy or silly. You could make the tone of your voice similar to the meaning of the word e.g. growl the word furious. Example: Mrs I, Mrs SSI, Mrs PPI. | |
| Rap A Rhyme Choose words which rhyme with the one you want in order to help spell it correctly. Example: flower, power, tower. | Post-It Plenty Write out any new vocabulary down on post-it notes and stick them on the furniture or word wall to see every day. | |
