Dates for your diary

PE

Homework

Your child will bring home two reading books every week. One will be their phonics reading book and the other will be their banded reading book. Please read with your child for 10 minutes every night and write a comment in their home school diary.

Our topic this half term is Let's Work





Communication and Language

We will be learning to:

- Pay attention to more than one thing at a time, which can be difficult.
- Understand 'why' questions, like: "Why do you think the caterpillar got so fat?"
- Sing a large repertoire of songs.



Literacy

We will be learning to:

- Engage in extended conversations about stories, learning new vocabulary.
- Use some of our print and letter knowledge in our early writing. For example: writing a pretend shopping list that starts at the top of the page; writing 'm' for mummy.



Mathematics

We will be learning to:

- Make comparisons between objects relating to size, length, weight and capacity.
- Link numerals and amounts. For example, showing the right number of objects to match the numeral, up to 5.
- Talk about and identify the patterns around us.
 For example, stripes on clothes and designs on rugs and wallpaper.











Physical Development

We will be learning to:

- Develop our movement, balancing, riding (scooters, trikes and bikes) and ball skills.
- Use large-muscle movements to wave flags and streamers, paint and make marks.
- Skip, hop, stand on one leg and hold a pose for a game like musical statues.
- Start taking part in some group activities which we make up for ourselves, or in teams.
- Match our developing physical skills to tasks and activities in the setting. For example, deciding whether to crawl, walk or run across a plank, depending on its length and width.



Understanding the World

We will be learning to:

- Explore collections of materials with similar and/or different properties.
- Show interest in different occupations.
- Plant seeds and care for growing plants.
- Understand the key features of the life cycle of a plant and an animal.



Expressive Art and Design

We will be learning to:

- Develop complex stories using small world equipment like animal sets, dolls and doll houses etc.
- Develop our own ideas and then decide which materials to use to express them.
- Draw with increasing complexity and detail, such as representing a face with a circle and including details.



Personal, Social and Emotional Development

We will be learning to:

- Develop our sense of responsibility and membership in a community.
- Become more outgoing with unfamiliar people, in the safe context of our setting.
- Play with one or more other children, extending and elaborating play ideas.
